Dr Annie Gray is one of Britain's leading food historians, specialising in the history of food and dining from c.1600 to the present day. She is an author, broadcaster and consultant.

She has published numerous books, including: Call the Midwife – The Official Cookbook, The Greedy Queen, The Official Downton Abbey Cookbook and Victory in the Kitchen – The Life of Churchill's Cook. Annie contributes to many publications such as Delicious Magazine, The Telegraph, The Guardian online and BBC Good Food.

She has been the resident food historian on BBC Radio 4's culinary panel show, *The Kitchen Cabinet*, since its inception in 2012 and published the show's companion book. Annie has also been a consultant and presenter on many BBC Two shows such as *Victorian Bakers* (BBC Two) and has appeared and consulted on *A Merry Tudor Christmas with Lucy Worsley* (BBC Two) and *Victoria and Albert: The Royal Wedding* (BBC Two), as well as appearing on *James Martin's Saturday Morning* (BBC One), *James Martin: Home Comforts* (BBC One) and *The Great British Bake Off* (BBC) among others.

Below is a copy of Liz's entry.

Dear President.

Thank you so much for inviting me to represent our branch at the WI's 100th anniversary garden party at Buckingham Palace. It was such an honour - a once in a lifetime opportunity, and one that changed my view of the WI.

I must confess to having to pinch myself as I walked through those familiar gates onto the forecourt of the palace. When we went under the stone archway where on TV we have seen so many dazzling horse-drawn coaches enter, into the very courtyard where kings and queens in sumptuous velvet and ermine cloaks and glittering gowns have alighted from their golden carriages, I felt as though I was in a dream.

Then there was the wonderful sight of the hundreds of fellow WI members gathered on the vast lawns at the back of the palace where the garden party was held. I stood on the terrace for a few moments and just took it all in. I've never seen so many fascinators gathered in one place! To add to my day I was delighted to be presented to Princess Alexandra, and relieved that I managed a reasonable curtsey without much wobble.

But exciting as all of that was, it's not the prime reason I will be forever grateful I was chosen to attend that day. I will remember it more because of the wonderful women I met and the stories they told me. There was Mary who is president of her tiny WI in Wales, a group that was started by her great aunt, of which her mother was also president, but which is now in danger of closing because of its declining numbers. I was in awe of Mary's determination to keep her WI going both in honour of her relatives but also because she knows that without their regular meetings her elderly members will have very little social contact.

Then there was Gillian, who told me about her terrible first marriage, where she suffered emotional bullying at the hands of her husband, lost self-esteem and the ability to imagine how she could go on. She received enormous support from her WI friends, and because of that support she realised that she deserved better, that she could have a happier life, and that gave her the courage to leave the relationship, and rebuild her life. Her eyes sparkled as she showed me her new wedding band and told me she was now married to a kind man and was very happy.

It was hearing those stories, and many more besides, that changed my view of what the WI is. Not only cakes and Jerusalem, resolutions and campaigns, but women being great friends to other women; women feeling and showing loyalty to others; women using their strength to help and inspire courage in other women. I now see that is the importance of the WI, and the memories of those women will stay with me always.

WEST KENT ART & CRAFT ANNUAL DAYS WAS ANOTHER BIG SUCCESS


The West Kent Art & Craft Annual Days were held on 20 and 21 September this year and once again proved a big hit with more than 250 West Kent Federation WI members who couldn't wait to come along to the hall at Ditton Community Centre, which was packed with people and stalls.

The days started with a welcome speech by Paula Bates, Chair of the West Kent Art & Craft Committee, and of course the biggest attractions, as always, were the speakers!

They were headed by Stephanie Smart of The House of Embroidered Paper on the amazing art of paper quilling and her Regency Wardrobe. Having had a display of her wonderfully detailed costumes — all made out of paper! — at the Royal Pavilion in Brighton this year, Stephanie elaborated on the techniques she uses to produce gorgeous period gowns, uniforms and hats with little curiosities woven into many of them to tell their stories.

For those wanting to know more, Stephanie is hosting a WI workshop on paper quilling on 23 March at St Nicholas Church Hall, Orpington, where members can learn how to make the stunning silver star she included in the long train of one of her Royal Pavilion gowns, as shown on her website.

Also speaking were: Paul Avis, Chairman of both The Decimus Burton Society and the Royal Tunbridge Wells Civic Society, who talked of the exciting plans to create a Decimus Burton Museum and Study Centre in the town in one of the buildings the famous architect designed as part of the extensive Calverley estate. The Museum vision includes creating rooms of the period complete with authentic decorations, furniture and accessories, as well as housing a Decimus Burton archive and, hopefully, a sensory garden.



And this year members were treated to a fascinating extra speaker squeezed in — Barbara Wilson of Love That Stuff, who captivated the audience with the story of how she came to be a Fairtrade champion and the charming goods made by Fairtrade communities in Nepal, India and Kenya she brought to display! Members will also be able to see Barbara and her goods at next year's West Kent Federation AGM on Monday 25th March at the Assembly Hall, Tunbridge Wells.



The Annual Days also hosted a raffle that included original paintings by West Kent WI favourite watercolour artist Matthew Palmer and acrylic paintings by Charles Evans, plus there were stalls galore, including the ever popular Bring & Buy, Rainham Sewing, Wood Turning, Silversmith Alison Le Fevre, Sue Roberts' Flowers, Nancy Adamek, Lina Patchwork and Love That Stuff.





Kent, and the rest of the country, for a varied programme of workshops, activities

ANNOUNCEMENT OF NEW WEST KENT FEDERATION OF WIS POETRY COMPETITION

Over the years Members have enjoyed both entering and reading the entries of the Emmie Shipman Award, especially when the subject was an item of poetry. Unfortunately the endowment behind the Award has been

exhausted and this particular competition has to cease. However, in recognition of the enthusiasm that WK Members have for poetry the Board of Trustees and the PALS subcommittee are pleased to announce a replacement Competition.

The West Kent Federation of WIs Poetry Competition is now launched following the same approach as the Emmie Shipman Award, other than it is exclusively a poetry competition.

The theme for 2024 is **Transport—how was your journey?**

Home Energy Saving

We've all been considering our Energy bills at home recently, with the thought of saving money and the environment, so here are a few ideas to do both.

Small measures you can take **heating only the water needed in kettle or tank **fitting LED lightbulbs (the new ones come in warmer tones!) **Fitting thermostats on individual radiators, and turning them down in little-used rooms **Putting lids on saucepans **Careful use of the washing machine, many items can be successfully washed at 30° **Avoid using the tumble drier, air dry instead (you can buy a very useful heated airer from Lakeland) **Consider different methods of cooking, instead of heating the oven use a microwave, air fryer or slow cooker.

Larger measures **If replacing appliances, aim for A rated for efficiency. **Insulate your loft, windows, doors ,cavity walls **Look at installing solar panels, heat pumps. Combine these with a storage battery.

Where to find advice? It can all seem a difficult task but there are people to help.
