Treasurer's Corner



It is indeed great news that most WIs have fully returned to their normal meetings and that some WIs are in fact thriving after the last couple of years. During the pandemic and in the early days of restrictions easing, many WIs had restricted meetings and during that time members who wanted tickets for workshops were asked to apply direct if their meetings were not being held.

It is requested that tickets for workshops are now ordered via your WI appointed representative. This will avoid any confusion with the event organisers and the WI treasurers who are responsible for paying West Kent Federation for tickets ordered.

If you have two WIs in your area please make sure you stipulate which WI you are e.g. Afternoon/Evening. Your co-operation would be most welcome.

October is MCS Month

The MCS (Membership Communication System) is the most important tool at all levels of the WI. Therefore, it is vitally important that the information stored there is kept up to date. To highlight this, June and October have been designated as 'MCS month' throughout the organisation.

All WIs are encouraged to appoint an MCS Rep to take responsibility for their records, and WIs who already have an MCS Rep are asked to ensure that all their records remain accurate:

Is where and when my WI meets correct? Are all paid-up members listed? Are all members' details correct? Do all members, including officers have a valid and up-to-date email address listed? Are all lapsed members removed? Are all officers' roles and committee positions assigned to the correct members?

The MCS enables communication throughout the organisation. When a new member joins, her details should be collected by her WI using the 'WI Member Registration Form' (available from your federation or to download from My WI) and added to the MCS. As soon as this is done, she will be sent her new member's welcome pack and begin receiving WI Life.



Well done to Judy Galbraith from Bearsted Green WI

Music will be my first love and it will be my last. Music of the future and music of the past.

Music is evocative and emotive for me. Just as people, of a certain age, can remember where they were when Elvis died – so, music conjures up vivid memories to me, of good times; bad times; happiness and sadness too. I was surrounded by music as far back as I can remember – the beautiful singing voice of my mother and the piano playing of my father, neither of whom could read a note of music. Perhaps, not such fond memories of my sister's violin practice, driving the dog to distraction, until we begged her to give up. I recall desperately wanting to sing the solo at primary school, yet all the "posh" girls were chosen. In the days pre-dating car radios, I remember singing Herman's Hermit's "Rise and Shine Sleepy Joe" to the rhythm of the windscreen wipers, while my father whistled an accompaniment.

Secondary school (and the acquisition of a Dansette record player) opened new doors, while the discovery of a second hand guitar made singing a reality that has lasted to this day (with apologies to my fellow WI members, who frequently have to endure it). The privilege of both my children becoming musicians was immense. To hear the wonderful sounds that a group of talented youngsters can produce, is such an experience, be it choral, orchestral, jazz, wind band, or (latterly, as in my adult son's case) heavy metal rock (don't discount it – it earns him money)!

My musical tastes are eclectic, from Elgar and Mozart, to Black Sabbath; Queen, Status Quo and Adele – anything that stirs my soul. A beautiful tune moves me to tears – sometimes to my great embarrassment. Listening to "Meditation" by Massenet, reduces me to a gibbering wreck, while T. Rex's "I Love to Boogie" has me leaping around the kitchen, in a most unbecoming manner. Music is a common language, that transcends all barriers of culture, creed and class and the progress of technology makes it accessible to all, no longer just those who can afford to experience it live. There is nothing quite so uplifting as the sound of military band music, resonating around the Albert Hall, or even thousands of voices lifted together, in celebration of the Queen's Jubilee.

Music can brighten the darkest days and fill the loneliest spaces with joy. I recall the wonder of seeing a very elderly lady, no longer able to exist in the reality of the world around her, dancing and singing, word perfect, to the wartime songs she remembered from her youth. Likewise, I have observed the peace of a fractious baby, finally sung to sleep, by an exhausted parent. So, what of the future? With so many talented writers and performers there is something for every taste, every age. Music will endure.

I can truly say, for me, to quote Hans Christian Anderson:

"Where words fail - music speaks"

HAVE YOU MET MY GOOD FRIEND LIBBY?

If you are a member of your local library then just make sure you have a library card and obtain a four digit pin - just ask a member of your library staff and they will help you.

In Kent we come under Kent Libraries & Archives with kent.overdrive.com. This enables us to download books, fact or fiction, magazines, also audio onto our electronic devices. The London Boroughs, your local library will be able to tell you your provider.

You can borrow up to ten items at a time, the period of loan is your choice, they are automatically removed after that time, but you can return them sooner. If a title is not available then you can put a hold on it and when it is available for loan you can borrow it.

Often they have a multi loan suitable for book clubs, so your group can all borrow the same title at the same time. You can, if you wish, adjust the size of the font and also have a sepia background so not to make it too bright for reading.

I find audio useful on those nights when sleep eludes you, you can set a time for the audio to run, so if you do, hopefully, fall back asleep you will not have missed too much of the story, headphones are useful for not disturbing others!

When you search for a particular author you can click the sorted by relevance box—release date and they should be in the order you would like to read them. Especially useful when reading a series based on the same character. I have been an avid reader all my life and always preferred paper books, but now I am preferring the electronic way.
